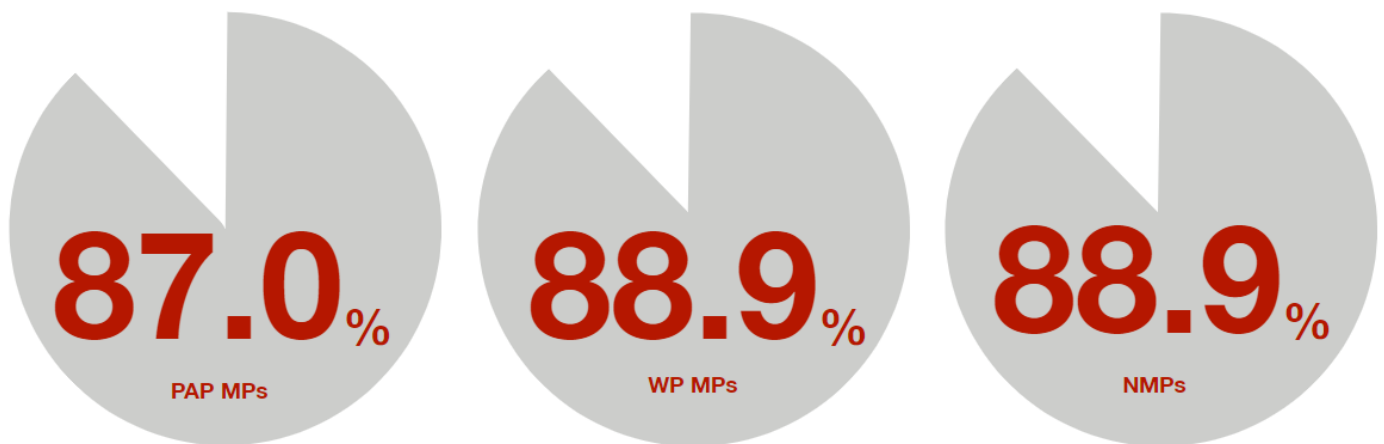

Percentage of attendance, by party:

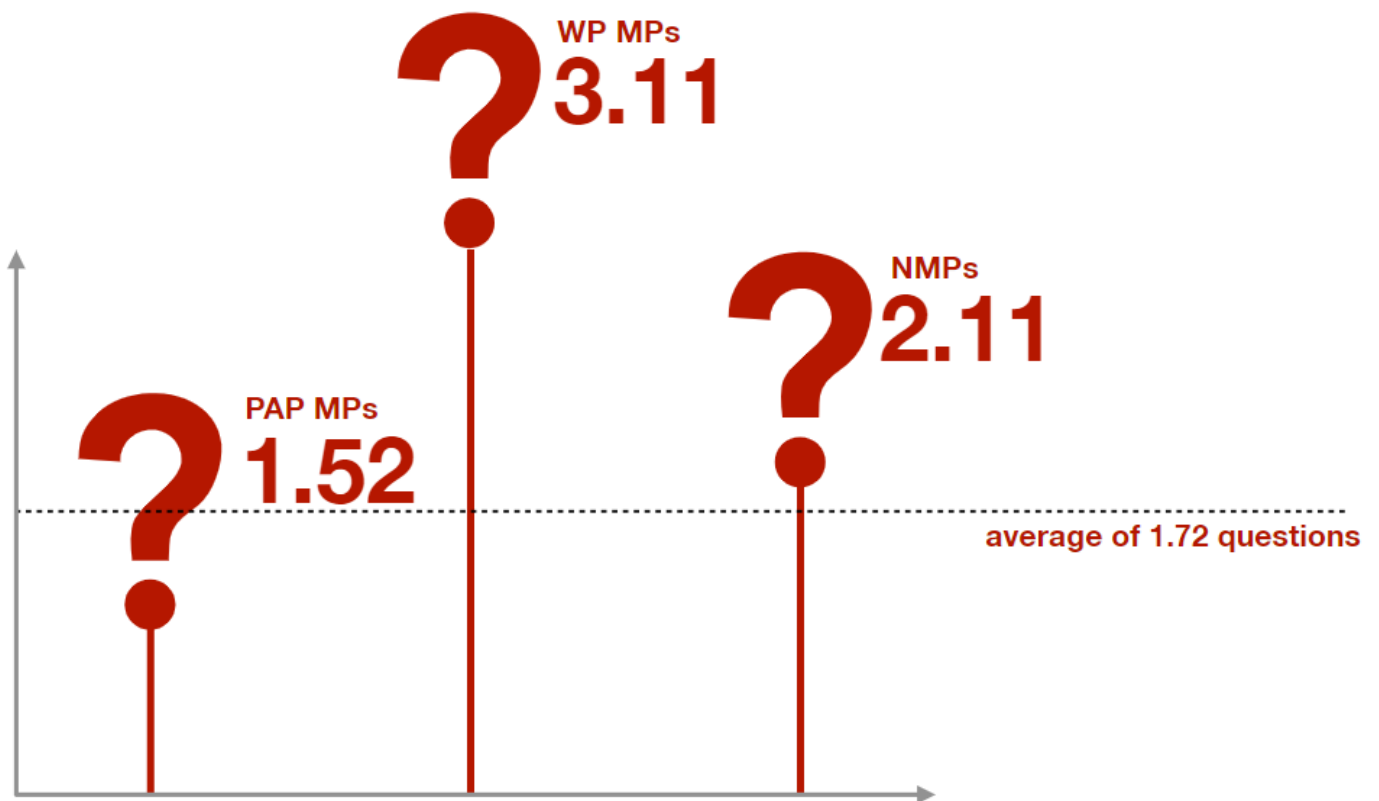
